Curiosity Corner (1) ...

I regret that I can give no source for the following news cutting but the event must have occurred sometime between 1953 and 1967.

Stanley Gibbons Ltd. have recently purchased what is claimed to be a unique musical instrument, a violin made almost entirely from postage stamps.

The body of the violin has been build up from some 30 layers of stamps and glue using approximately 12,000 stamps in total. Newspaper cuttings purchased with the instrument indicate

that the original 1950's owner and builder was a Mr. George Inch. He used the current 2d Wilding to give an authentic brown colouring with Dutch and US stamps as a trim.

Ian Brushwood, Stanley Gibbons Retail Director, spotted the violin in a provincial auction whilst waiting for his wife to give birth to their son. "With nothing else to do but wait, I read everything in sight" he said. "I saw

the violin featured in the Daily Telegraph and used the hospital pay phone to place a bid."

Stanley Gibbons will add the violin to their growing memorabilia collection which is part to the regular window display at 399 Strand, London, UK.

Curiosity Corner (2) ...

A 1961 court case in South Africa provided a startling victory for the "flyspeck brigade" of philatelic specialist.

In a Johannesburg court case, expert evidence proved beyond doubt that stamps used on receipts could not have existed at the time that the receipts were purported to have been given.

Mr John Booysen, a foreman printer of the Government Stamp Printing Works at Pretoria, was giving evidence in a case involving fraud of over half a million pounds, to which the accused had pleaded not guilty.

Inspecting four receipts bearing stamps which had been cancelled in September and Nov ember, 1956, and in January and February, 1957, Mr Booyser said that the existence of minute markings on the stamps allowed him to definitely say that they were not available during that period.

Mr. Booyser went on to say that he had eventually found a 1957 cylinder which bore markings identical to those on the stamps and that no stamps had been printed from that cylinder until April, 1957.

The court then took on the aspect of a philatelic society meeting at which a specialised display, including enlarged photographs of stamps showing minor varieties were put on display.

Famous Philatelic Personalitiies ...

Herman (Pat) Herst (1910–1999) was a world-class stamp collector, dealer and auctioneer who gained renown for forming his own private mail service in Shrub Oak, New York.

After earning a Master's Degree from the University of Oregon, Hearst began working on Wall Street as a delivery boy but soon gravitated toward Nassau Street which was then the epicentre of American philately. He began dealing in stamps and in due course was able to open his own Nassau Street shop in 1935 when he was just 25.Soon he was staging auctions and cranking out *"Herst's Outbursts"*, his acclaimed newsletter.

He forged strong ties with philatelic circles in Britain and championed the popular trend of collecting stamps by theme (topicals), all the while building a significant mail order business.

When he decided to relocate his business to the community of Shrub Oak (p.674), the 100,000 pieces of mail that followed him there caused the local post office to be elevated from third to second class status. However, deliveries were irregular and so

Hearst invoked a little used 1862 law that allowed private post offices under such circumstances. With the help of his children, and his trusty German Shepherd, Alfie, the mail went out



from Herst's post office off East Main Street at a rate of two cents a letter.

In 1973, Herst moved to Florida and went on to become Florida's leading philatelist, eventually donating his collection to Florida Atlantic university, which established the Herst Philatelic Library.

During his lifetime, he was a member of 81 different stamp clubs as well as the American Civil Liberties Union, Americans United for Separation of Church and State, Citizens for Religious Liberty, and the Baker Street Irregulars. He wrote several books on philately and was the recipient of many "Service to Philately" awards from prestigious societies such as the American Philatelic Society and Britain's Philatelic Traders Society.

Stamp on the Envelope ...

The stamp on the envelope this month is a joint project with the postal authorities of Canada, Greenland, and Norway to mark the 150th anniversary of the birth of Otto Sverdrup, Arctic explorer.

Sverdrup was born in Åbygda, Norway, in 1854. His uncle owned a fleet of coastal vessels and, in due course, Sverdrup was taken on first as mate, then as skipper.

In1888 he met Fridtjof Nansen and took part in an expedition crossing the Greenland icecap. It was on this

trip that he impressed everyone not just with his practical skills but also his great physical and psychological toughness without which it is likely all would have perished.

Their next expedition was to try and reach the North Pole and Sverdrup was captain of the *"Fram"* in its celebrated 1893–6 drift across the top of the world.

However, his relationship with Canada was formed when he spent four years (1898–1902) in ice in the Ellesmere Island region during which time he discovered the Sverdrup Islands as well as mapping large areas of the high Arctic.

The sovereignty of these areas was a matter of dispute between Norway and Canada that was not finally settled until the Canadian government purchased Sverdrup's maps just before he died in 1930 (aged 77). [See Scott #847:1980 – "Acquisition of Arctic Islands" where Sverdrup is *not* mentioned].

In 1907 Sverdrup moved to Cuba where he ran a sugar plantation but returned to the Arctic in several occasions to organise rescue missions for missing expeditions.

Although Sverdrup was internationally recognized for his achievements, until recently he was not particularly well known in his native Norway being overshadowed by Nansen and Amundsen.

In 1957, a monument was erected in Steinkjer, his family's hometown, and Canada was represented at the ceremony by Henry Larsen, captain of "St. Roch" [Scott #777:1978] – the first vessel to traverse the North West Passage both ways.

The three stamp designs used for these commemoratives were prepared by Martin Mörk, who also designed and engraved Canada's \$2 Polar Bear definitive along with some 400 other stamps for Norway, Sweden and Greenland.

A souvenir sheet including the same design but with \$1.40 denomination has also been issued.
