The Red Kettle

With the hustle and bustle of the Christmas season, the entering and leaving shops and grocery stores, a familiar sight may have been seen. That sight is the Red Kettle, perhaps with a person beside it, smiling and giving well wishes for the Christmas holidays. Alternatively, at the grocery stores, volunteers are standing with pre-packaged bags of goods which can be purchased and donated to foods banks. It seems like these sights are a traditional part of Christmas. But what about the volunteers, where or how have they become involved with these charitable requests?

Some familiar organizations that assist in the care for others can be the local firefighters accepting gifts for kids. Just recently a trip to the grocery store was greeted with local police officers and auxiliary members offering bags of pre-packaged groceries, which can be purchased and donated to the local food bank. At the time of writing, the Red Kettle hasn't been at the places regularly visited, but surely will be coming soon. These last two requests for help are the brain child of the Salvation Army.

As a church, the Salvation Army is an organization that offers hope and support to vulnerable people in local communities. This organization is in some four hundred communities across Canada and can be found world wide. Many other countries have issued stamps featuring the Salvation Army. A recent article in the local newspaper suggests that there are between two and three hundred homeless people living in and around Owen Sound.



From a philatelic sense, the Salvation Army has also appeared on Canadian Stamps. In 1982, Canada Post issued a stamp celebrating the 100th anniversary of the

founding of the Salvation Army in Canada. This stamp is listed as #954 in Unitrade Specialized Catalogue of Canadian Stamps. Unitrade details that 21 million stamps were printed and the stamp was designed by Theo Dimson. The stamp design shows two members wearing the distinctive uniforms with a background of city buildings and a church. The female is also holding a tambourine which is easy to connect with the musical element that also comes from this fellowship.

A recent website search found this new (to me) site, https://postagestampguide.com which provided even more information than Unitrade has about this stamp. In the section titled "About Stamp" Jacob refers to some of the work done by the church. What came to special attention to me was the following statement "The Salvationists' war work, especially during the Second World War, brought comfort to thousands of service personnel and civilians." This ties in very nicely with Unitrade #1506.

A former neighbour served in the army during World War II, and was so thankful to the Salvation Army people who staffed the tent



behind the front lines. There the volunteers provided hot coffee, soup and sandwiches for the soldiers coming from the front. This free service was so very welcome; Gordon left his estate to the local citadel after his passing. Gordon served on the Italian front from 1943-4 which is the subject matter of #1506.

Looking at the stamp, the designer, Pierre-Yves Pelletier, based the scenes on illustrations drawn by Jean-Pierre Armanville. The scene shows the infantry assaulting an unnamed village over a railroad line. Note that the postage rate is about half of what it is today, forty cents versus eighty five cents now. With the colour brown as the base of the stamp, it is probably referring to a ground campaign. The participation of the Canadian 1st Division is really the first major active part of the Canadian forces in World War II, not forgetting the smaller contingent of soldiers at Hong Kong and the raid at Dieppe in 1942.

Like the previous stamp, Unitrade #'s 2745, 2746i and 2747, the connection to the Salvation Army is not obvious. These three stamps are issued to remember the sinking of the *RMS Empress of Ireland*. While sinking ships are personally very distasteful subject, the sinking did occur on May 29th, 1914. Similar to other stamps, there is a lot



to this story hidden in the background. The designation "RMS" is short form for "Royal Mail Ship" which means that this ship was hired to carry the Royal mail from the United Kingdom to Canada. On a regular run between the ports of Liverpool and Quebec City, the ship also served as the means for many people to immigrate to Canada from Europe.

Number 2746i is a high denomination stamp, with a face value of \$2.50. This rate was the charge for mailing a letter to an international destination. This particular stamp gives an overview of what happened on that fateful day. The Empress of Ireland is in the middle of the stamp with some mist/fog in the background, and almost hidden from view is the SS Storstad which collided with the Empress.

For many sailors, the idea of meeting another ship on the starboard (right) side of the ship is considered to be bad etiquette and something to be avoided. While coming into and falling out of visibility, neither ship could estimate the risk of collision until the Storstad came out of the fog and smashed into the Empress's starboard side. Since it was a smaller ship than the Empress, the damage from the collision occurred below the waterline and in the middle of the ship. The damage was catastrophic and the Empress sank in about fifteen minutes. This very quick time lead to the deaths of over 1,000 people. This total is comprised of both passengers and crew and there was not very much time to launch lifeboats since the ship listed to starboard and the port lifeboats were therefore useless to save lives.

Part of the passengers on the Empress this trip was about one hundred and seventy members of the Salvation Army going to England for a conference. Different sources provide varying numbers of the members who died in the sinking, but almost the entire group died with the ship. About eight people of the Salvation Army survived the sinking. This tragedy affected this church immensely, but obviously, it is still and active part of our community.

Some details about the stamps are worthy to note. Unitrade #2746i was designed by Isabelle Toussaint. There were two hundred thousand stamps printed by Lowe-Martin and a further five thousand uncut press sheets. Unitrade #2745 and 2747 were also printed by Lowe-Martin and are marked as "P" postage, which was eighty five cents at the time, and is still the same today. Two different numbers are associated with this stamp as they were printed in different formats. Unitrade #2745 was printed as perforated singles with 1.2

million stamps printed. Unitrade #2747 was printed as peel and stick booklets of ten stamps. Two million of these stamps were printed. The designer of these two stamps is Susan Scott.

In the remaining days before the arrival of Christmas, please remember the "Red Kettle" and what it represents to our community. There are many people visiting the food banks and food distribution agencies like O Share and Safe and Sound.

November Meeting Highlights

A good number of members arrived to enjoy the evening of meeting fellow collectors. About seventeen members were present. A financial report was given indicating the club was in sound financial position. Following that report there was a brief overview of the Circuit Books.

Our Circuit Book managers reported that they had attended the GRVPA Circuit Book Club Fair in Brantford. Attendance was good and a pleasant day was had by all who attended. There was a payout of the sales already accounted for. I hope there is a sense of accomplishment now that the duplicates file has been weeded down somewhat.

Randy also shared that the website has attracted over 43,000 visitors since the website was revamped. Quite impressive! I believe the Circuit Book listings greatly help the number of visitors, and hopefully help in finding the stamps wanted/needed for a collection. Randy also requested for members to see if they had any photos of the show from this past September so that they could be added to the web page.

Planning was done for the Christmas meeting. Please bring along some goodies and refreshments for everyone at the meeting to enjoy. There will also be a Gift Exchange, which is very simple in format, bring a gift, draw a number and when that number is called you are able to draw from the assortments of presents other have brought.

As a last item, the editor has suggested that the newsletter be given a name. The idea was prompted by some of the names mentioned in the last newsletter and so suggestions were requested from the members. The following is a list made at the meeting:

We will vote at this meeting. Because of the large number of name choices, each member will have the chance to select three names. The top three names chosen will then be presented for final selection at some time before the end of the meeting.

As a suggested new name for this newsletter, "The Admirals Messenger," is based on the history of this region. William Fitzwilliam charted this area in 1815 and named the bay in honour of his brother Admiral Edward Owen. The messenger part refers to how the Admiral communicates with the officers and crew, so this name reflects the how we as members are kept up to date and informed about our hobby.

This meeting was also the third and last Silent Auction for this year for club members. I was able to sell one item and in return I also bought another item. This helped me fill in some holes in a particular country collection. There were other people successful in making sales, but the over all result is on an individual basis. While the Silent Auction was open for bids, other members started to go through the Sales Circuit Books.

The meeting ended at nine PM and chairs and tables were returned to their original position ready for the school use the next day.

Mad Marker Returns

Several philatelic magazines have opined and complained about the marking of stamps with pen cancellations, rendering them useless for collectors as well as removing the possibility of reusing the same stamp again on another letter. I have seen mention of pen cancellations in the Stamp Magazine from the UK and The Canadian Philatelist, from the RPSC.

It puts to wonder just how much mail is passing through the mail centres uncancelled. One person ventured a guess in The Canadian Philatelist that probably 30% of the mail was passing through these facilities unfranked. I would support that guess and it could be possibly even higher. It

seems that if the volume of mail overwhelms the machines, a quick sort sends the mail unfranked to its destination. It is at that point where the local postal clerks dig out the pen, marker, china pencils etc to obliterate the stamps missed by the mechanization of the post office.

Considering the morale in that workplace, it is surprising that the clerks would deface the stamps, and not just Canadian stamps, but any stamp from any country! Over the last year or so, I have been receiving mail without cancellations, a frustrating, but not an impossible problem to solve. It just requires a road trip so some friendlier post offices.

Over a year ago my mail was arriving with pen cancellations done by an over zealous postal clerk. All was quiet on that front and so the hope was the person had been educated on not doing so, or had perhaps retired. Last week my mail was again graced with hand cancellations, this time with a black china pencil. The following two scans show the diligent efforts of another clerk here in the Owen Sound Post Office. Has anyone else had the pleasure of receiving such wonderful artistic renderings?

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


