From Dr. Phil A. Telly ...

Stamps got you licked? Feeling stamped out? Don't worry. Don't let it get you down, Dr. Phil A. Telly has come to town!

Dear Dr. Phil,

I have been very busy sorting out my older British stamps. While working away I came across the Scott listing #154a, a 1 penny King George V stamp described as aniline scarlet. I only have one example of #154 so how can I tell if it is aniline scarlet? What is aniline scarlet and are there other issues that are aniline scarlet? Pease help me to have a red letter day. Tell me that you do give a damn! Sincerely yours, Scarlet O' Hara

My Dear Scarlet,

How's Rhett? As for your question, Aniline Scarlet describes the properties of the ink not so much the colour. This type of ink tends to bleed (lose its colour fastness) which can be seen by turning the stamp over and seeing the colour bleeding through the stamp, changing the colour of the back of the stamp. This can been see on several early Canadian issues, especially the three cent Jubilee, as well as stamps from several other countries. These are usually listed in Scott's catalog.

Aniline inks came in most colours and were used on stamps primarily because they were inexpensive and were fast drying thus speeding up the printing process.

Hope this answers your question. Dr. Phil

<u>Stamp on Envelope...</u> Art Canada: Mary Pratt

As a person who has felt great satisfaction standing back to admire the gleam of sunlight through my just finished jars of homemade jelly, I can really appreciate Mary Pratt's painting "Jelly Shelf", depicted on Art Canada's latest regular

rate postage stamp. Mary Pratt is a well known artist born and raised in Fredericton New Brunswick. She now lives in St. John's, Newfoundland. A great body of her work focuses on the beauty of simple domestic objects. Her style of work is called New Realism. The work is very detailed and all traces of brushstrokes have been painstakingly removed. Her work shows a wonderful sense of light, colour and composition. Mary studied with other famous artists such as Alex Colville and Lawren Harris. Her husband, Christopher Pratt is also a great Canadian artist.

"Jelly Shelf is being released on March 15th, 2007 in a pane of 16 stamps. Similar to last month's stamps re: International Polar Year, this pane has a gutter strip format. The 52 cent stamp is also released alongside of the \$1.55 "Iceberg in the North Atlantic" on a souvenir sheet. Although the theme of domestic images is close to Mary's heart, "Iceberg in the North Atlantic" shows the great range of subject matter that Mary Pratt is capable of and beautifully contrasts "Jelly Shelf". It would seem that the Iceberg is only available on the souvenir sheet.

I am going away the day before this stamp is issued. So, I owe a big thank you to Inga from the Tara Post Office who has agreed to put your stamps on the envelopes. Because of this your stamps will be postmarked on the first day of issue. Thanks Inga!
