How can I tell the different issues apart? Thinking that more information would help me through this first rate dilemma I went on the handy dandy world wide web. I found a great website by a fellow who calls himself the Machin Nut. Everybody seems to using the saying "too much information" these days. In this case it really is true. If my head doesn't implode, I'm pretty sure it will explode. Is there any way to simplify this mess?

Save me Dr. Phil, 1st Rate Problem



Dear 1st,

Machins can be a real problem but you have to read all the info in your catalog, (I am using Scotts) and you should be able to figure it out. I am only going into the 2nd designation stamps, these were reissued several times in Dark Blue and Bright Blue. This would be my first sort. Next I would check for the Syncopated issues. To answer the question what is syncopated see the picture above. Next would come the die cut stamps which can be distinguished by the smoothness of the perforations as opposed to the normal perforation which have been torn apart. Lastly most issues had some variation in perforations so get that perf gauge out and get to work. I hope this helps you wade through these stamps.

University of Saskatchewan: 100th Anniversary

April 3rd marks the 100th anniversary of the establishment of the University of Saskatchewan. In honour of this occasion, Canada Post has issued another handsome booklet stamp in it's series celebrating important anniversaries of our institutes of higher learning. The school's colours of green and gold form a background for a sepia-toned photograph of the entrance to the College Building. The foreground sports the school shield bearing three wheat sheaves and an open book with the Latin words "Deo et Patrie" (For God and Country).

The main campus of the University is built on 300 acres and also has 1,000 acres for agriculture. The school has a distinct architectural style known as Collegiate Gothic. The architects Brown and Wallace from Montreal worked right into the twenties, overseeing the construction of 14 major buildings.

Now 19,000 students attend this University along with 7,000 faculty and staff. The school is well known for it's medical/doctoral program amongst the over 100 areas of study offered on it's premises. The illustrious John D. Diefenbaker earned three degrees there and is buried near to a building named in his honour. Pamela Wallin, Ramon Hnatyshyn and Roy Romanow are also famous alumni of the University of Saskatchewan

This is a self adhesive domestic rate stamp (52 cents), available only in a booklet of eight.
