British Guiana Wrapper to Waterloo Theological Seminary By Dr John K. Courtis FRPSL

In late March 2021, a listing on eBay caught my attention: a Post Office postal stationery wrapper from British Guiana to Waterloo Theological Seminary (WTS). In a prior study by the author of destinations, covering the period September 2003 to December 2020, it was found that of the 467 wrappers mailed to addresses outside British Guiana, only 17 were to Canadian addresses, *Continued on page 4*

Grand Extras By George Pepall

I picked up these two Edward VII precancelled issues because I hadn't been aware that precancels existed upside down/ inverted like this. I thought they must be a bit of a rarity despite being inexpensive. It turns out that inverts are the most common of varieties on precancelled stamps. Less common varieties are damaged lines and letters, missing letters and added markings such as dots. In Victoria precancels are found on the 1c, 2c and 5c denominations of the seven stamps in the Edwardian set of 1903-1908.

Precancels were invented and put into business and government use to expedite mail, saving time and work hours for employees who previously had to hand-cancel tons of



outgoing flyers, receipts and invoices. They also ensured that stamps were used for the employer's purposes and didn't find their way onto workers' personal letters.

Precancels are described as being silent or quiet if they don't show the city or town of origin. These two, then, might be described as vocal because they tell us that they were used in Victoria.

Early precancels were normally a line or a series of lines placed on the stamp. Some were printed, but most were hand applied. Pen, pencil, crayon, cork, brush, and daub were the most commonly used.

All in all, precancels are a fascinating area for specialization, with lots of availability and a definitive specialized catalogue, *The Standard Canada Precancel Catalogue*.

British Guiana Wrapper to Waterloo Theological Seminary

none of which were to WTS. A second wrapper to the same address was listed in early April. As this is an uncommon destination with an intriguing address it merited a social philately investigation.

This Post Office issue appeared in 1938 with different paper varieties: green on light buff and yellow green on buff and these are shown in Figure 1. Both wrappers are postmarked NEW AMSTERDAM and dated 27 SP 43 and 19 NO 43 respectively. The first question that arose is whether such an address actually existed in 1943 and this in turn prompted an enquiry to the archivist, Cindy Preece, at Wilfrid Laurier University in Waterloo. Martin Luther University College houses archives for the Eastern Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada.

Ms. Preece was most helpful in unravelling the nomenclature and timeline. She advised "Waterloo Theological Seminary was one of the many names used to refer to the Evangelical Lutheran Seminary of Canada (later Waterloo Lutheran Seminary and now Martin Luther University College). The "nicknames" were used by locals, students, alumni, faculty, the Lutheran Church, and even by the Seminary itself." ...She continues: "The Seminary has always been an arm of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada or its predecessors (ELCIC was formed in 1986). In 1943, that church body was the United Lutheran Church in America. Throughout its history, the Seminary trained men that served as missionaries to countries around the world. It had a long-standing relationship with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in British Guiana. The January 30, 1932 issue of the campus newspaper, *The Cord*, recounts a meeting of the Cossman-Hayunga Missionary Society where a topic of discussion was that there was only one Lutheran missionary in British Guiana."

A 1932 fund-raising pamphlet, *The Call of Waterloo College and Seminary* (October) provides some historical context. *Waterloo Theological Seminary* was founded in 1911. Since its opening, by 1932 it had graduated 60 Lutheran Church ministers. *Waterloo College School* was organized in 1914, becoming the Faculty of Arts in Waterloo College in 1924. In 17 years to 1932 it graduated 44 students, eight of which became pastors, six were in the Seminary preparing for the ministry, another three were studying post-graduate and planned to enter the Seminary in 1933, and the rest were teaching in schools, colleges, and universities.

Amsterdam, British Guiana. This is the regional capital of East Berbice-Corentyne and one of the country's largest towns. It is locat-100 kilometres from the ed capital Georgetown on the eastern bank of the Berbice River six kilometres from its mouth at the Atlantic Ocean. It was originally a village. and as early as the 1760s it included a brick Lutheran church which was the only surviving building after the 1763 slave uprising.

In 1803, the British took control of the colonies of Berbice, Essequibo, and Demerara. In 1831, these colonies were joined to form the colony of British Guiana. Colonists had migrated to the coastland and the Lutherans applied for land in the new town of New Amsterdam. In 1795, they were granted land which the Church now occupies at Lutheran Courts. In 1943, the year the wrappers were postmarked. the Evangelical Lutheran Church in British Guiana was constitutionally organized. Pastor Patrick Magalee became President of the Church from 1943 to 1949. Details of the history of the church in New Amsterdam can be found on the excellent website www.elcguyana.org/history.php

A final comment by the archivist is worth noting: "Due to the long history of Seminary



graduates travelling to and working in British Guyana, it would not be surprising to learn that documents, magazines, newspapers, and other items were mailed back and forth." One unanswered question though is how did these two wrappers appear on the philatelic market. I contacted the eBay seller 'bellesite' (located in Mahopac Falls, New York) to see if there was any further information. His reply stated that he bought only these two wrappers and that they were included in a postal history lot containing both US and foreign covers. Why these 1943 postmarked wrappers were retained in the first place and then ended up in a postal history collection are questions that remain to be resolved.

Empire Air Mail Rate - 4¢ Postcard Rate from Canada

As many members are probably aware, Britain started the air mail scheme empire (EAMS) in 1937 to provide airmail service to commonwealth countries, the rate was set at 1¹/₂d per half ounce for first class letters 1d for postcards. The EAMS was ended with the start of WWII in September 1939.

In February 1938 Canada joined the EAMS with a rate exchange of 6¢ per half ounce for a first-class letter and 4c

for postcards. The old service rate of 6ϕ per ounce for first class letters and 2¢ for postcards was discontinued, and as a result, postcards were often sent short paid.

Page 10 of the Canada Official Postal Guide 1938-1939 (pictured above right) shows the countries and rates that applied to the EAMS.

Canadian postcards with the EAMS rate are

exceedingly difficult to find and even harder to find, are postcards that are *not* short paid.

Shown bottom left is a 2ϕ prepaid postcard from Vancouver to South Africa. added is the 2c 1927 Fathers of Confederation stamp to bring the total to the proper 4c rate. The card was Mailed on Mar 1 taking the first official flight between Vancouver and Montreal and arrived on Mar 2 in

All first class mail (letters, postcards and other articles prepaid at letter rate) posted in Canada for the following Empire Countries is carried exclusively by air BEYOND ENGLAND under the Empire Air Mail Scheme as the normal means of transmission. The rate for letters is 6c. per half ounce or fraction thereof and 4c. each for postcards.

This map gives a general look at the new Australia/New Zealand route, but without city names.


Check out your collection for postcards using the Empire Air Mail Scheme. You may have a rare postcard rate.


The second EAMS postcard (above) is from British Columbia to New Zealand. Australia and New Zealand joined the EAMS in July 1938 and since the program effectively ended on Sep 1939 this rate was only in effect approximately 14 months. This card was cancelled May 28 on the Royal Train at 6pm which was en route near Sicamous, British Columbia. On that date and time there are only 5 known covers, so this is the six piece of mail and only known postcard.

The card was short paid 2ϕ and shows a tax mark of 20 centimes which is paid with a 2d postage due stamp in New Zealand.

The card is also stamped with the post office handstamp "PLEASE ADVISE YOUR COR-RESPONDENTS THAT THE LETTER RATE FROM CANADA IS SIX CENTS PER HALF OUNCE" which is the correct rate for a first class letter but incorrect for a postcard.




